

AFTERNOON RIVERBOAT CRUISE IOWA FALLS IA

Some Cool Fun on a Hot Day for FFCI





We're taking a 75-minute private cruise on a double decker pontoon boat on the Iowa River at Iowa Falls. You can sit in the airconditioned lower level or on the open-air upper deck. The boat is handicapped accessible. Our captain will tell us a little history of the river and the town.

Monday, July 11 Leaving from the parking lot of First Christian Church in Ames at 12:30, if you want to carpool. (It takes about 65 minutes to get there from Ames.) The lodge will be open to use the restrooms.





Brought to Iowa Falls by the Fitz family in 1991, the Scenic City Empress is the crown jewel of the Iowa River. The Empress is a 50 passenger double-decker pontoon boat that hosts weekend public cruises as well as private cruises June through mid-October. Cruises offer beautiful scenery of limestone bluffs, man-made waterfall, wildlife, the historic swinging bridge, and more- all pointed out by the Captain's historic narrative. Enjoy the cruise in the enclosed air-conditioned lower level or on the upper deck for breathtaking views. The boat leaves from the Scenic City Boat House (1113 Union St., Iowa Falls) at 2:00.

Bring \$10. admission in cash and a sun hat and sunscreen if you plan to sit outdoors.

Iced tea, lemonade, cookies, and bars will be provided. There is a restroom on the boat.

REMEMBERING FFCI Activities from 2021

On Friday, February 12, the FFCI celebrated Valentine's Day by having a Zoom Valentine Party. Finding club members to participate was easy, and **30 audience members logged on to see 19 acts.** There were Valentine quotations, poem recitations, love songs, guitar playing, a comedy act, a story, a memoir, whistling, sewing projects, a demonstration of handmade porcelain dolls, a list of reasons Why I Like to Wear a Mask, pantomimes, and Valentine cards and a pie to get everyone in a festive mood. The party lasted two hours. Corry and Charene received many positive comments about this event and one request to do a get-acquainted activity every month!

On June 23, thirty-three members met at the shelter at Ada Hayden Park for a barbecue lunch. The site, although it could not be reserved ahead of time, was chosen because it had a beautiful flower garden next to it and a beautiful body of water. It was a very windy day, making set up difficult. The meats were prepared by Hickory Park and the sides were made by Charene, Corry, and Dot. Sedahlia, Karen S. and Kueier brought additional dessert items. After the meal, people told jokes, puns, and stories—some related to traveling—as the entertainment.

Because of covid and the new variant strain, **twenty-six club members met outside at Brookside Park on August 17 for a dessert party.** These were the offerings:

People were eager to get out of the house and converse with friends, so there were no games or activities. Sadly, this was the last event attended by member Joan Herwig.

On October 3, 2021, twenty-three Friendship Force of Central Iowa members attended a concert by the Lake Wobegone Brass Band at Ames City Hall, and afterwards some of the concert goers gathered at Della Viti for drinks and appetizers.

Band director Michael Hatstenson educated the audience that this band is like a British brass band, which means it is limited to specific instruments and excludes trumpets and French horns. He had each horn player stand and wave his /her instrument in the air as he explained what it was. About one third of the band instruments were percussion instruments.

One of the percussionists is Bob Smithson, son of FFCI club members Polly Gilbert and Lee Smithson. Bob had played in bands at Ames High and also at ISU. It was the Smithsons who invited this all-volunteer, non-profit band to town and made us aware of the concert. Many of the players are retired music teachers and professional musicians. At least thirteen of Smithsons' family members attended the concert and helped fill the balcony, and twenty additional FFCI members sat in a reserved section on the main floor. Everyone was required to be masked, and everybody cooperated without incident.

The concert was a benefit for Cub Scout Troop 160, which has 18 boys and nine girls, eight of whom are Eagle Scouts. The ticket fees went to the troop and will be used for camp fees and scholarships.

The Lake Wobegon Brass Band drove here (from Minnesota) and back on Sunday. They hadn't performed in front of an audience for two years, so they were delighted to be playing for a live audience that showed its appreciation for their music. Corrie Bertelsen
