OUTBOUND JOURNY TO FF WESTERN MONTANA-MISSOULA SEPTEMBER 11 - 19, 2023

On September 11, 2023, six FFCI members journeyed to Missoula, MT where we were hosted by the FF Western Montana-Missoula. The six ambassadors from our club were Sedahlia Crase, Margaret Epplin, Joan Matthews, Judy Mongin, Ron Mowers, and Diane Oppedal. In addition to these six FFCI members from our own club, we were joined by two members from FFGDM, two from FFCR/IC, and one from FFEW/NI (Eastern Washington/Northern Idaho). This was a great mix and we enjoyed getting to know the members who had joined us for the journey along with our hosts and other members of FFWM-Missoula.

The members of FFWM-Missoula proudly shared their home city as well as the surrounding area. The visit was packed full of highlights of the Missoula area including Traveler's Rest State Park, the only documented campsite for the Lewis and Clark expedition; the Confederated Salish Kootenai National Bison Range, where some of us sited bison feeding; the Missoun at St. Ignatius whose history is entwined with the early settlement of that area; Ft. Missoula Area and Museum; the beautiful Carousel of Missoula, where we rode the "horses;" Missoula Smokejumper Center, a first for many of us; Blackfoot Pathways: Sculpture in the Wild; Garnett Ghost Town; the new award winning Missoula Public Library; and a Walking Tour of downtown Missoula.

Free time activities included seeing the University of Montana campus, hiking up the mountain to where a large M was visible above the campus, and lots of conversations with hosts and ambassadors. We all enjoyed small group dinners in member homes, as well as dinners in Missoula, lunch at the Traveler's Rest, and a wonderful going away dinner.







Joan Herwig wrote the following article pertaining to a lady from the New Zealand Friendship Force. Alice has since passed away. She cetainly was living proof that Friendship Force does promote friendship among countries.

We say that Friendship Force is about meeting people and becoming friends, about experiencing the culture and daily life of people in other places, about sharing, and communicating. And this has certainly been the Friendship Force experience for Carole Magilton and me. We could not have anticipated the richness, the wonder, and the amazing connections with Friendship Force members from around the world when we joined FFCI in 2007! Here is a brief story of one such "connection during our recent exchange to New Zealand.

We first met Alice Walker in 2009 when we joined our FFCI Exchange to Saratov, Russia. She joined our Open World exchange that took us to Moscow, Saratov, and St. Petersburg. A very amiable, energetic woman who enthusiastically told us about her beloved New Zealand as we traveled together throughout Russia and became friends.

Then, in 2010 we had an FFCI Exchange to Accra, Ghana, and Alice, again, decided she would like to join us since she had not been to Africa yet. So, early on the morning of our first day in Accra, we heard a knock on our bedroom door....and there was Alice! She had arrived in the wee hours of the morning and was "full steam ahead" for adventure and new Friendship Force connections. And we shared many memorable events and cultural places during the 2010 World Cup when Ghana beat the USA!

In the passing years, Alice has come to visit us FFCI ambassadors in Iowa on several occasions and she has remained in email contact with some members.

In early 2014, Carole and I began to explore possibilities for an FF exchange to New Zealand that would include the October 14 to 16 FFI World Conference plus an extended tour. We found the Sarasota, FL Friendship Force club's New Zealand exchange plus conference and tour of the FF World Catalog, it fit our criteria perfectly. We applied and made the necessary arrangements. And guess what? Yup, you guessed it! Our homestay was in Whangarei, New Zealand Alice's home Friendship Force club. Did you also guess that Alice was the Exchange Director for this Sarasota, FL Exchange? How incredible is that?

We are happy to report that Alice continues to be an "amazing energizer bunny" as she led us into gardens and museums and the Maori Treaty Grounds, organized afternoon tea and evening dine arounds and attended to our various comforts while sharing the best of her community. Alice and her red Ford were a force to be reckoned with! At the end of our Whangarei exchange, we all decided that we want to be Alice "when we grow up"Alice is 87 years old.

Indeed, it was a pleasure to experience Alice's community, to befriend her friends and so to learn about her beloved New Zealand.

NEWS FROM THE MEMBERSHIP


